The goal of Child Protective Services (CPS) is to identify, assess and provide services to children and families in an effort to protect children, preserve families, whenever possible, and prevent further maltreatment. Child Protective Services is non-punitive in its approach and is directed toward enabling families to provide adequate care for their children.

Local departments of social services are responsible for receiving reports of abuse and neglect; conducting investigations to determine the validity of the CPS reports; and providing services that enhance child safety and prevent further

abuse and neglect to families and children. CPS also develops statewide public awareness and education programs and administers state and federal grants to prevent abuse and neglect.

CPS Hotline staff may provide general information and educational materials about child abuse or neglect to callers from the general public, child care providers, school educators and medical professionals on recognizing and reporting suspected child abuse or neglect.

The Virginia Department of Social Services operates a statewide Child Protective Services (CPS) Hotline 24/7 to support local departments of social services by receiving reports of child abuse and neglect and referring them to the appropriate local department of social services. The CPS Hotline is staffed by trained Protective Service Hotline Specialists.

Anyone can report suspected child abuse or neglect to a local department of social services or to the CPS Hotline. Callers will be asked to provide as much information as possible about the child, the alleged abuser and the incident. You are not required to give your name when you make the report, but if you do identify yourself, the local department of social services will be able to contact you for further information if needed and will be able to inform you of actions that were taken.

Each report is sent to the proper local social service agency to be evaluated to determine whether the report information meets the legal definition of child abuse or neglect and whether CPS has the authority and responsibility to conduct a family assessment or an investigation to determine the child's immediate safety needs and to determine if the family needs services.

Youth Services

Youth ages 11 - 18 years of age or from grades six through twelve are impacted to remain in school, graduate and pursue post secondary education, employment or military enrollment. When funds are available, youth may be placed in career experiences (summer employment) during summer months or after school. Older youth may be provided resources to obtain their G.E.D. or other credential while also acquiring job readiness skills via in-office training.

Salvation Army Angel Tree

The Salvation Army Angel Tree program helps provide Christmas gifts for hundreds of thousands of children around the country each year. Once a child or senior adult has been registered and accepted as an Angel their Christmas wish list is shared with donors in your community who purchase gifts of new clothing and toys. The gifts are distributed to the family to place under their family Christmas tree.

The Salvation Army collects necessary information to determine qualification for participation in the program and details on each Angel. Examples may include, but are not limited to: photo ID, proof of residence (lease, utility bill or mail received from the school district or other government agency). Examples of documents needed for each child may include but are not limited to : birth certificate, official custody or guardianship papers, clothing and shoe sizes, and a toy wish for each child. No private information for you or your Angel is shared with the public. Donors will only be given a first name and Christmas wish list for each Angel.

While the Salvation Army operates an Angel Tree program in many cities around the U.S. and Canada, it may or may not operate in your area. Furthermore, not every Salvation Army site that has an Angel Tree program uses this website to collect applications. Enter your zip code in the space provided. If it returns a

message that your area is not currently served by this site, contact your local Salvation Army to determine if they have other ways for you to apply.

Helpful Hint: As part of the application process you may be asked to provide copies of documentation. You will be able to upload from scanned copies or take photos. If you wish to take photos, please visit this site and begin your application from your camera enabled mobile device.

McKinney Vento

Who is considered homeless?

According to federal legislation, any child who lacks a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence is considered homeless. Children qualify if they are:

- sharing housing with others due to loss of housing, economic hardship or another similar reason;
- living in hotels, motels, trailer parks, camping grounds due to lack of adequate alternative accommodations;
- living in emergency or transitional shelters;
- abandoned in hospitals/unaccompanied youth;
- awaiting foster care placement;
- living in a public/private place not designed for humans to live;
- living in cars, parks, abandoned buildings, bus or train stations; or
- are migratory children.

Additionally, students residing on their own or with someone who is not their parent or legal guardian due to being in a homeless situation are considered Unaccompanied Homeless Youth.

Services provided by DCPS:

If a student is found eligible for services under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, DCPS can provide the following services:

- Transportation: Transportation services to a student's school of origin are arranged for by the Office of School Social Work Services.
- Free Meals: Students are automatically enrolled to receive free meals (breakfast and lunch) and do not need to complete paperwork through DCPS Food Services.
- Clothing and School Supplies: School Social Work Services works with community partners to provide emergency clothing and/or school supplies if needed.
- Referrals to local resources.

To determine the eligibility of a student and the entire household for Project HOPE (McKinney-Vento), parents/guardians should complete the domicile form. There are places on the form to document whether or not additional services as noted above are needed.

What families experiencing homeless need to know:

Parents/guardians do not need a permanent address to enroll a child in school. Homeless children and youth have a right to enroll immediately in school, even if:

- students do not have required documents, such as school records, records of immunization and other required health records, proof of residency, guardianship, or other documents; or
- students have missed application or enrollment deadlines during any period of homelessness.

Students have the right to enroll in either the school of origin (school the child or youth attended before becoming homeless or was last enrolled) or the school in

the attendance zone where the child is currently living, whichever circumstance proves to be in the child's best interest.

A child has the right to transportation services to and from the school of origin if returning to their home school is found to be in their best interest. A child has the right to participate in extracurricular activities and all federal, state, or local programs for which he/she is eligible. Unaccompanied homeless youth have these same rights and can be assisted by the Homeless Education Liaison or their designee.
