To construct a Works Cited entry, list the elements in order that apply to each source. If something doesn't apply to the source, skip it and move on to the next element. The punctuation needed for each element is listed after the element.

Core Elements of MLA 9th Ed. Citations

Additional tips:

1. Double space your Works Cited entries. It was not done on this sample sheet to conserve space.
2. If you are keying the Works Cited entries, you must use italics for book, magazine, or newspaper titles. If you are hand-writing them, then you would underline the title.
3. Not all sources have all elements of a citation. If this is the case, skip the missing piece and go to the next element.
4. Works Cited entries use a hanging indentation format, i.e., the first line aligns with the left margin and each additional line is indented 5 spaces. To create this format using the on-screen ruler, see a librarian or English teacher for instructions. Do not [ENTER] at the end of a line.
5. URLs: Some instructors will require the full URL address in the citation.
